
Virtual Archive Open Day, 5th May 2021




















Remembering Old Latins

Lieutenant Harry Hands (Class of 1940)



Thanks to contributions received from the nephew of Harry Hands, the late Robert Munday remembered below (Class of 1970), and Harry's daughter, Carolyn (Head Girl 1967), we would like to celebrate the extraordinary life of Lieutenant Harry Hands, who attended RLS from 1935-40.

William Henry ('Harry') Hands was born in Buckingham in 1924, the youngest child of Frank Hands, a butcher who had served as a cavalryman during the First World War, and his wife, Ethel. Growing up in the 1930s, Harry dreamt of flying aeroplanes while he played with his wooden model versions as a young boy. When Germany invaded Poland on September 1, 1939, he was working in his father's shop, but as the weekend passed, and Britain declared war, he finally saw a way to become a pilot. He volunteered for the RAF in 1943 and was sent to the US, where he trained in Texas. His instructor turned out to be a German-born pilot who flew for the 'side' during the First World War. In 1944 he joined the RAF as a Sergeant.

His opportunity came to actually fly in 1944 when he joined the RAF as a Sergeant. By the time he was 30, Hands was one of the Fleet Air Arm's most experienced combat pilots and one of its most versatile aviators, having flown 29 types of aircraft, from Tiger Moths to Grumman Wildcats, Sea Mosquitos and de Havilland Vampires, and set a naval air-speed record for a flight to Malta. Hands was one of two naval pilots who completed the 1,586-mile journey on February 6, 1953, in three hours and ten minutes, flying Hawker Sea Furies, one of the fastest piston-engined fighters ever produced. It was a brief but notable prelude to his involvement in a much more forbidding theatre of aviation: the Korean War.

In April 1953 Hands joined other pilots from No 807 Naval Air Squadron on the deck of HMS Ocean, a Colossus-class aircraft carrier. The ship was bound for the west coast of Korea, where there was heavy fighting between the communist North, supported by China and Russia, and the democratic South, supported by the western allies under the banner of the United Nations. Flying the Fury, Hands was in constant action during the last months of the three-year conflict, which was halted by an armistice on July 27, 1953. The Fury was used mainly as a ground-attack aircraft, but also as an escort fighter and had, in a remarkable episode a year earlier, shot down a North Korean MiG-15 jet that was 200mph faster.

Hands flew 98 missions from the landing deck of HMS Ocean, which arrived on station in the Yellow Sea in mid-May. He was in action almost immediately and his logbook entries rattle like a machine gun, with several sorties a day. On May 25 he flew a combat air patrol lasting nearly two hours; later that day he attacked North Korean anti-aircraft batteries; and he completed operations with a reconnaissance flight searching for enemy trains. His flying schedule was typical of the pilots serving with 807 Squadron. On another occasion he was involved in a mid-air collision while forming up over the carrier, but survived.

In an interview with Forces Television in 2019, Hands recalled the terrifying nature of some of his missions. 'Instead of firing straight at you, and often missing,' he said, 'the North Koreans had a nasty habit of firing straight up in the air so you hit this sheet of bullets, which wasn't pleasant at all. We lost several pilots.' Afterwards, he was awarded the United Nations Korea Medal. He ended his career with the Fleet Air Arm six years later with 1,634 flying hours in his logbook, but the huge G forces exerted on his body while divebombing in Korea took their toll and he suffered debilitating back pain for the rest of his life.

A year later Hands volunteered for transfer to the Fleet Air Arm, which was seeking pilots for the expansion of its carrier force. He joined 881 Naval Air Squadron and was posted to South Africa, where the pilots converted to the Grumman Hellcat and developed new tactics for ground attack. An inveterate smoker, he liked the Hellcat; it had an ashtray built into the cockpit. He had been due to join the British Pacific Fleet when the atomic bombs were dropped on Japan and the war ended. A convivial man regarded by his friends as both a 'charmer' and a raconteur, he returned to Britain in some comfort, with a first-class cabin on the Cunard liner RMS Mauretania.

After a brief period as an instructor Hands left the Fleet Air Arm in 1946 to become a Post Office engineer. He rejoined the service in late 1951 because of a shortage of experienced pilots. Training on Seafires — the naval version of the Spitfire — he mastered new aerobatics such as wingtip cartwheels and inverted spins, but also dive-bombing from angles of up to 60 degrees before being sent to the Far East. He is believed to have been the last surviving pilot of a Seafire. He also liked big cars. In the 1950s he bought a 1929 6.5-litre Bentley that he drove from Scotland to the naval air station at Culdrose in Cornwall. At the age of 92 he reluctantly gave up a beloved BMW.

Hands had left the Fleet Air Arm in 1959 to become a civilian airtraffic control officer, but he continued to work with military units on projects that included the development of the Harrier jump jet. On the day he retired at the age of 60 he was taken up in a Sea Fury by the Royal Navy's Historic Flight at Yeovilton. The visit was meant to be a surprise, but Hands had got wind of the trip and did some homework on his aerobatics. Once in the air, the pilot politely asked him if he would like to take control. 'Thank you,' he replied, 'I have control!' before launching into his aerobatic programme.

Lockdown and school opening at RLS

Since the last issue, we have all been forced to continue to live under lockdown restrictions, with remote learning continuing into March. However, again, the school has remained open throughout for the children of key workers. We were thrilled to open our doors again to students in the second week of March, and it has been wonderful to hear the classrooms and fields come back to life, albeit with mask wearing and bi-weekly testing involved.

Before students were allowed to return to school, RLS staff volunteers also successfully delivered the mammoth task of performing lateral flow tests on all students and staff (along with a further two rounds of tests of all students once school resumed), to allow everyone to return to school as safely as possible. Communal areas including the main hall and lecture theatre were transformed into testing centres and the whole exercise was executed smoothly and efficiently - a credit to everyone involved at RLS.



The school once more took full advantage of the emptier school during lockdown to carry out important improvements and repairs to the site, such as the sympathetic replacement of rotting window frames in Brookfield, thanks to a 'decarbonisation' grant awarded to us for this work. During the process of the removal of old window frames, the contractors involved stumbled across old newspaper pages that had been used to pad out the window frame cavities - the oldest newspapers they had ever come across in the course of their work. These fragments of *The Morning Post* provide a fascinating insight into the reading habits and interests of the occupants (or workmen) of Brookfield House in the 1930s.



Community support by RLS student during lockdown



We are very proud of Sulayman, a current Year 10 student who was awarded one of 22 Purple Plaques dedicated to community heroes up and down the country. The national awards were put in place this year to mark 22 years since the census began, to honour ordinary people who had done extraordinary things and had shown outstanding dedication to their local communities. Sulayman was awarded this prestigious plaque for his services to his home community in Buckingham. Initially inspired by Marcus Rashford, Sulayman set up Buckingham Free Meals last October to provide hot meals and food parcels to people in need in the local area.

The project has mobilised a small army of volunteers to help generate donations, prepare, cook and deliver food to Buckingham and within a 10 mile radius - something that was even more critical during the pandemic with economic insecurity and isolation rife. In the latest lockdown alone it has been providing up to 300 meals per week. Sulayman commented: 'I am truly honoured to have received the Census 2021 Community Hero Award, amongst the 100s of entries that were submitted. I wanted to do something that would help the people in my own community in these challenging times and the support of so many volunteers alongside me has helped to make this vision a reality.'

Charlotte Wilson (Class of 2016)





Careers and Work Experience



The pandemic has had an impact on every academic year group, in so many ways. Overall, we are extremely proud of the way in which our students have coped, and overcome the challenges they have been faced with.

Lockdown has meant that students have been unable to visit universities in the way they usually would, or attend careers fairs and events, including our own really popular Aspirations Evening. The usual work experience schedule - whereby Year 10 complete a week placement with a local employer, and Year 12 also spend time with employers, gaining valuable experience and skills - has also not been possible.

'No real-life work experience for the Year 10 and 12 cohorts has been a real loss' said Jane Comben, RLS Head of Work Related Learning. "Some employers have been great though, and there are a huge range of virtual experiences available, which has actually increased the accessibility of some careers. Year 10 will be taking part in a two day virtual work experience event with John Lewis in June, which is great - but we're really looking forward to being able to introduce students to local employers again next year."

Sports Campus Urgent Appeal Gathers Pace



Against all odds, the construction of the Sports Campus has continued throughout the pandemic and is on schedule to be completed in July, followed by fitting-out, and an official opening planned for the Autumn.

With £107,000 still to raise at the time of writing, and just ten weeks until building completion, Mr Hudson is renewing his appeal to Old Latins to donate if they can (see his letter, overleaf).

"It's taken us five long years to raise £2.9m to make the Sports Campus happen", states Jo Ballantine, Royal Latin Director of Development. "It's an incredible achievement for such a small community, with few resources, and with a pandemic to contend with. It's testament not only to how much we all believe in the value of investing in the physical health and mental wellbeing of our young people, but also to just how very special the Royal Latin community is. It's been a long slog though, with lots of setbacks and disappointments along the way - not least the government's refusal to help with funding.



Everyone's tired, but we're so very close to fulfilling our Sports Campus dream now. I'm making one final plea to our alumni community to help us reach our goal. If everyone does a little, we'll be able to make that final payment - and then breathe a sigh of relief!"

I very much hope you are keeping safe and well. You may well be wondering why I am writing this letter to you at this time. It is a mark of the urgency of our fundraising challenge that I feel the need to update you and to ask directly for your support.

As you know, students' mental health & wellbeing are at the heart of what we do. In September all students will begin benefitting from the Sports Campus. The facilities will be an important addition to the school, and will play a vital role in helping our young people to rebuild resilience, both physically and psychologically.




