Remembrance 2016

Our school Remembrance Service was held on Thursday 10th November 2016 and we were privileged to welcome guests from the Royal British Legion, Armed Forces, Civilian Forces and local establishments, including Old Latins such as Major James Beechy (Class of 2000).

Readings from our Senior Student Leadership team, Lt Col Robinson and RLS English teacher, Penny Mason, (who read *In Flanders Fields*) reminded us why it is so important to hold services of Remembrance and Lt Robb Bloomfield (Class of 2000) read the exhortation and Kohima epitaph. As the school stood in respectful silence, Deputy Head, Jacquie Baldock, recited the names of the fallen Royal Latin students from the two World Wars – the names of whom are now forever carved in Portland Stone on the wall just outside the school hall. These new plaques exist thanks to a generous donation from the Buckingham British Legion, with the legacy left by the former president, Peggy Dale.

Next year's Remembrance Service at RLS will take place on Friday, 10th November 2017. Rotherfield Renovation Update

The much-needed renovation of Rotherfield House is now underway, and due to be completed by the end of this academic year.

The development will provide a modern, flexible and professional working environment together with new dining facilities and a new main focal entrance point. Additionally, the scheme will accommodate 400 post-16 students, and will deliver more learning resources for both collaborative and independent learning. After planning permission was officially granted in December 2016, David Hudson remarked,

'We are very excited to finally be embarking on a long-overdue refurbishment of Rotherfield House. These essential works will not only enable us to create a much-needed modern study environment for our large 6th form, but will also enable us to renovate and weatherproof one of the most loved and important buildings on the Royal Latin site. We are very much looking forward to enjoying the revitalised building.'

Sporting History

Thank you to Jennifer Beckett (née Jones) from the Class of 1959 for lending the following original photograph to the RLS Archive. The photo was posted from Canada by Jennifer's cousin, Mary Gingrich (née Spiers) and features Mary's mother and Jennifer's great-aunt, Melina Jones, as captain in the centre of the front row.



Melina was a talented hockey player by all accounts, playing for the county as well as the school. Melina's younger sister, Frida Jones was also at the RLS in the 1920s, as was their brother, Bert, who was Jennifer's father, and who also excelled at sport, also captaining the boys' hockey time during his time at the RLS. Similar contemporary photos in the archive have helped us to narrow down the date of this particular photo to around 1924.



In Memorium - Old Latins Remembered

Derek Lillistone - 1940s



Brian Lillistone (Class of 1948) writes about his brother Derek, who attended the RLS in the early 1940s.

Derek Lillistone died on 12th October 2016 at the age of 83 of cancer and Parkinson's.

Derek seems to be the only person to appear twice on the school honours boards, once for his County Scholarship in 1950 and then for his State Scholarship in 1951 to Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge to read geography. He was Head Boy and excelled on the sports field both at school and later at Cambridge.

Whilst at School Derek was All England Schools' senior high jump champion at Port Sunlight, setting a record that stood for many years; he was also a high jump record holder at Bucks Schools' Sports, this again stood for many years.

At Cambridge he changed to the long jump and was awarded a 'Blue' and beat his Oxford opponent at The White City in April 1953 with a jump of 21 feet 5 inches winning by almost a foot. He also represented Cambridge in the high hurdles and the hop, step and jump as well as being in his college hockey team.

Derek remained active until his last few years, playing hockey in Felixstowe until he was over 70, before taking up rambling.

After Cambridge he entered the Colonial Service and was a District Officer in Tanganyika, as it then was. After independence Derek re-trained as a teacher at Makerere University in Uganda and then taught in Tanzania for a number of years, where he is still remembered for building a running track and promoting athletics and sport at his School in Tabora.

Derek married Old Latin Jill Camm and they returned to England in the early 1970s after the birth of their daughter, Susan. Derek spent most of his subsequent career as Senior Geography Master at Deben High School at Felixstowe in Suffolk. At Deben, Derek promoted and organised The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme for many years.

Derek is survived by Jill, a son, two daughters, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Maurice Thomas Hall - 'Modge' (1940s)



It is with great sadness that we record the death of 'Modge', who joined the RLS as a pupil in September 1943.

H.B. Toft was then Headmaster, being followed in 1949 by G. K. Embleton. Modge's great friend, Jim Faulkner, who spoke so movingly at Modge's funeral, was to join RLS in 1944.

Modge was a fine sportsman, playing for school cricket and football teams. In his funeral eulogy, Jim Faulkner remembered 'Taffy' Williams, their teacher, telling the boys that if they wanted to learn how to dribble the football then, 'Watch Modge Hall!'. Other teachers such as T.R. Allitt and E.W. Archer taught him tennis, badminton and table tennis in after school practices.

Modge left the RLS early, as did most farmers' sons, and went to work for his father at Elm Tree and North End Farms, Steeple Claydon. He was married to June in 1964 and they came to live in London Road, Buckingham at the bottom of Brookfield Lane, which is still the family home. Among their wedding guests were George and Edna Embleton, as well as Reg Howard, Head of English and Boarding House Master, as well as a great friend over many years. Modge and June have two children and two grandchildren. Modge took up golf in in the 1970s becoming a very good golfer and captain of Buckingham in 1986. His Captain's Day was attended by George and Edna Embleton, a source of great pride to Modge.

Many of us will remember Modge at the Archive Open Days, looking through the School Magazines and sports photographs of his school days and enjoying meeting old school friends once again Modge had a sharp mind, a wonderfully dry sense of humour, a love of his wife, his family, his friends - and the golf course.



Gerald Sear (1940s)

Thank you to Sue Hilsdon (Class of 1976), for getting in touch to relay the sad news that her father, and fellow Old Latin (1939-44), Gerald Sear, died, in Devon, in September 2016. Gerald was born in 1928, attending Miss French's school in Buckingham before obtaining a scholarship to RLS in 1939. He was





proud of his heritage, his school and his town. After leaving school he was articled to be a civil engineer, but was called up to military service after the war. He was a lifelong Buckingham Town Football Club supporter and was a Life Vice President (RLS Archivist, Robert Munday, remembers him well from his days playing for BTFC). Gerald and his wife lived in Buckingham until 1998, when they moved to Devon to be closer to Sue and her family. Gerald continued to participate in the Local History Society and has left a rich collection of memories, anecdotes and photos for the town.

We are grateful for Sue's kind offer to donate some of her father's reports to the RLS Archive.



Henry Burke (Class of 2015) - 1997-2016

The whole of the Royal Latin community has been distraught to hear the desperately sad news that Henry Burke has passed away, after leaving RLS only last year.

He was a much-loved member of the school and contributed so much to school life. He was a constant member of the rugby team and a regular cast

member for school productions. Staff and students remember him as a good friend and as an engaging and considerate young man. Henry will be sorely missed by those from the school community who knew him, and our thoughts and prayers are, of course, very much with his family. His parents have been keen to emphasise how much Henry enjoyed his time at the RLS. A memorial service, at which memories of Henry were shared by Headteacher, David Hudson, was held in the school hall on Saturday 17th December 2016.

Julyan Francis Bunney - Former Deputy Head

Mr Bunney was Deputy Headteacher at RLS. from 1968, appointed by G.K Embleton and retiring in the mid-1980s during the headship of Peter Luff.

He was a proud Cornishman, born in Truro in a humble background whose academic abilities won him a place at a

good secondary school and later a scholarship at Exeter University to read Physics. He entered the Royal Navy in the last months of the war and after his discharge became a teacher at Caterham School, Lord Williams, Thame, Carmel College Oxford and finally at the RLS as Deputy Head and teacher of Physics.

He loved Cornwall, holidays walking in the Lake District, Sheep Dog Trialling and playing Bridge- an exceptionally talented player. With his wife Rona, he loved horse racing, especially Point to Point and walking their collie dogs in the Oxfordshire countryside. Ed and I remember him, as do so many Old Latins who have contacted us, as an excellent teacher who always put teaching his classes before any Deputy Head demands; as a fair man who in disciplining

boys managed to maintain their respect; as a colleague who was always supportive, organised and capable of coping calmly with the unexpected daily challenges of school life. Mr Bunney was one of the last of those men who came into teaching after WWII and whose life experiences and values did so much to shape the careers of young men and women coming into teaching in the following years. The funeral service was at St Michael's Church Cumnor on Wednesday 21st December. Ed Grimsdale and Andy Cooper attended.

'Scotty' Gordon (Class of 1977)

It is with sadness that we report the passing of Mark, a pupil at RLS in the 1970s.

After leaving the school Mark went to Manchester University and then after a number of career changes, took a Law Degree at Buckingham University before qualifying as a Barrister. Tragically his

Law career was cut short with the onset of Huntingdon's disease, with which he battled courageously for many years. Mark was a talented rugby player for Buckingham, a strong character who was a great friend to so many in the town. His funeral was at St Bernardine's Church in Buckingham on 23rd December.



Andrea Michelle Oakley 'Andi' -Former RLS modern languages teacher

At Andi's funeral in October 2016, her daughters spoke movingly about their mum, about her love and concern for them, the importance of education in their lives, morality and strong mindedness - all inspired through Andi's example.

Andi came to the RLS in September

1984 during the Headship of Peter Luff and left some 17 years later when Cecilia Galloway was Head. As Head of MFL she introduced Italian into the 6th form curriculum, achieving astonishing results. But more remarkable was her approach to teaching; her students were prepared to work extremely hard for her - Andi was a 'lifementor' as much as teacher. She could be impulsive, spontaneous, very amusing but, always with the aim of getting the best out of her students. As a teaching colleague, Andi could always be relied on to challenge conventional wisdom. She was very intelligent, independent in her thought, humanitarian in her outlook on life and an essential presence if you wanted the party to go well!

At University Andi had studied French and Italian and her love for languages took her on many travels in Europe and further afield. She was also an excellent ballroom dancer, and as a young girl swam the English Channel. On her retirement she became a very accomplished artist with a number of exhibitions. Tim Hawkins, Mary Gentle, Frances Lawless, Lorna Piper and Clive and Pauline Martin represented her RLS teaching colleagues as well as this writer and his wife, Sally. Arron Quainton, Fiona Hewitt, Jane Harrington, Vicky Hurst and Ian Roberts were among Old Latins attending the service, and many wrote very moving tributes. As one Old Latin wrote, 'Au revoir, repose en paix'.

A Message from Lauren, Year 13, Team GB Rower

I am a currently a pupil of the Royal Latin's sixth form and will be sitting A-levels in Biology, Philosophy and Ethics and History this June. I was very unwell throughout the second year at the school, as a rare throat infection led to my antibodies attacking the frontal lobes in my brain and I spent nine months in and out of the John Radcliffe Hospital with brain damage. My parents were told that I would have to be taken care of for the rest of my life and would never be capable of looking after myself.

The support from the sport staff started here - Miss Gahagan ran a sponsored run in aid of the ward that took care of me and it was then I promised myself I would one day do something amazing in sport, no matter what the doctors told me I couldn't do.

As a result of the illness I have been left with a tic disorder which could last the rest of my life. I defied the expectations of doctors by returning to full time education within a year. Part of my rehabilitation was exercising, and it was then I found my love for competing. I represented the school in athletics at the district championships and still hold school records in the discus and relay, winning the junior Victrix Ludorum on sports day one year. I also captained the school netball team, played for the hockey team and took up PE for my GCSEs. Sport became an outlet for me, and the encouragement of the staff and the amazing fun I had both in games lessons with my friends and competing for the school led me to seek out what else sport could offer me, and I began rowing.

Throughout the last two years the Latin has helped me fit my education around a very demanding training schedule, also making sure I was up to date on my schoolwork, and that I was healthy and happy. They took a huge interest in what I was doing, even rewarding me with the school's first 'rowing' colour when I won the National Championships. When I represented Great Britain for the first time I was rewarded with 'international' colours which a number of high achieving students have been given when they have been selected by and competed for their country. It has always struck me that the athletes competing for sports outside the school get just as much recognition and support as those who compete for the school, and all levels of sporting participation are recognised. This means that sport is not just reserved for the 'elite' which is incredibly important.

Last summer I earned a British vest, having been selected to represent the country in the 4s and 8s at the Coupe de la Jeunesse (European Championships) and came back with a gold, silver and bronze medal. I owe a huge amount of my success to the support of my school and hope that they can continue to do this for students in the future. New sporting facilities would make this so much easier, and would encourage so many more students to take this opportunity to be fit, healthy and possibly find a sport that they love enough to be competitive in.

I feel as though I owe a lot to the school sports department and hope that you can help me give back to them, and to give this amazing opportunity to future students of the Royal Latin School.



Harry Hands (Class of 1940)

of December 1939, describing Harry's impressive achievement of cycling from Buckingham to Preston, Lancashire, at the age of 15, using Youth Hostel accommodation en route.

BEDS AND YOUTH HOSTELS

One of the biggest pleasures of any holiday is the thrill of sleeping in a strange room. In my case, I was cycling up to Preston in order to stay for several weeks with relatives. I set off on the Thursday morning with no idea as to where I was going to sleep that night. I wondered whether it would be some cottage or farm-house in the country, or whether it would be somewhere in one of the large towns through which I was to reas:

But, strangely enough, as I was leaving Leicester, at about one o'clock, after eating my dinner, I met another cyclist who was going to Manchester. After a while, our conversation turned towards the question of accommodation for the night, and he told me that he belonged to the Youth Hostel Association, which I had thought of joining. He explained to me that if I wished to accompany him, he could get me an introduction permit at Derby, which would allow me to go to the Hostel with him. When we reached Derby at about five o'clock, we went to the Y.H.A. offices, and after the necessary permit had been obtained, we were informed that there was a Youth Hostel named Overton Hall, about twenty miles away.

the Y.H.A. offices, and after the necessary passes hamed Overton Hall, were informed that there was a Youth Hostel named Overton Hall, after much wandering along country lanes and sheep tracks, almost all of which went uphill. In fact, the last three or four miles were all up a very steep hill. The experience of first entering a hostel did not seem at all strange, for one speedily felt at home. Soon we were playing in a table-tennis tournament, in which I got knocked out early, although my companion reached the final before losing. At ten o'clock everyone turned in. The rising bell sounded at eight o'clock and the breakfast bell at eight-thirty. Certain rules must be observed at all Youth Hostels, but they are really only to be expected. Everyone makes his own bed and folds up his blankets. Breakfast, which consisted of porridge, bacon and eggs, and marmalade, was brought in by one orderly from each table. After breakfast, all helped to wash up, sweep and tidy up. When this was done, one was free. The initial cost is: bed, one shilling; and breakfast I/3. A hot supper can also be obtained for 1/3.

To anyone who does consider going on a cycle tour, I recommend these Youth Hostels, for they are so cheap, and comfortable and every one there is like oneself, out on a holiday, with no worries or troubles.

A VISIT TO A TEST MATCH

During August of last year, I was lucky enough to be able to be present at the last day's play of the last Test against the Australians. I got up extra early and took a bus to the Oval. When I arrived, I joined a queue at the schoolboys' entrance and at about 9.15 the gates were opened and we were let in. Once inside, I made myself comfortable on the ground and prepared to wait an hour and a half until play began. After about an hour, however, some of the Australians came out to practice in front of the pavilion.

Rob Smith (early 1990s)



Rob Smith, who left the RLS in the early '90s recently embarked on a polar expedition that made him the first British explorer to travel a new route across the Antarctic to the South Pole since Sir Ernest Shackleton, 100 years ago. He and his fellow polar explorer and guide, Eric Philips, reached the South Pole on 10th January 2017, with this expedition following another trek to the North Pole in April 2016.

Three years ago, Rob's best friend, Neil, was diagnosed with Oesophagus and Lung Cancer and given only a few weeks to live. Sadly, Neil passed away in 2012 leaving a wife and new born baby. Just over a month later, Rob's mother Maureen passed away after a twenty-five-year battle with multiple cancers. One month later, Rob then found himself diagnosed with Cancer. Having undergone surgery and chemotherapy and an extensive 2-year battle, Rob eventually overcame the disease.

As a result of his personal experiences of cancer, Rob resolved to fight back against the disease by finding ways to raise money for research, and discovered Icetrek - a company that organises polar expeditions, and uses experienced polar guides, such as renowned adventurer, Eric Philips, who has supported Rob on his expeditions.





'We were in touch with him in Antarctica and followed his progress closely. We very much look forward to Rob visiting us in 2017, to share his courageous adventure with our students.'

Class of 1991 Reunion, 15th October 2016



On Saturday 15th October 2016 the RLS hosted a 25th anniversary class reunion of the class of 1991.

WALKING up and down Brookfield Lane was an integral part of my daily routine during my teenage years.

But there'd been a 25 year gap since the last journey, and now I was meandering up to 'The Latin' with my husband. To be truthful, it was quite nerve-wracking.

We walked past the old sixth form block (which, as a 2nd year, filled me with awe and has long-since become a private house), and I pointed out Rotherfield, which was where my classmates and I spent our A' Level years. The rickety, cold T-Huts had gone. When I was at RLS, Brookfield House was the headmaster's residence, as well as home to a smattering of boarders. So when Marc – my other half – and I stepped over the threshold, it felt as if I were trespassing on Peter Luff's domain. But that soon faded when I walked into the elegant reception room and was met by tens of people that took me back quarter of a century.

Most of the class of 1991 hadn't changed at all – same familiar faces and, it soon became clear, same familiar characters. After warm acknowledgements, we fell into conversations about our school days, with anecdotes and reminders of a time that seemed like only yesterday.

The walls of the room were decorated with old pictures and we spent too long pointing out our former selves, laughing at memories of those we recognised and remembering those who have, sadly, already passed away.

There was little time to get comfortable though, because we were there to snoop around the corridors and rooms that had been our domain for our formative years. As we walked through Brookfield's cobbled stable-yard, I couldn't help but laugh at the tiny room which had been the computer lab. In the late 80s it had housed

naive technology which we visited only briefly every week. It was here that Mr Grimsdale had bellowed at me on a sunny summer's day when I daftly enquired whether we could work outside!

The tour proper started at our old science block. These former biology, chemistry and physics labs have all but been ripped out now, but they still had a slight whiff of gas in the air. I took biology A' Level, and I still say 'protozoa' in a Welsh accent, thanks to my teacher Miss Clark. The replacement science block, built on the grassy bank where the girls sat during clement lunchtimes, is astounding. It is a beautiful stream-lined building with state-of-the art facilities and a rooftop patio. It was a fabulous spot to stop and take photos, while the RLS reunion team, headed by Director of Development, Jo Ballantine, patiently waited for us to move on.

Next, we climbed up the bank to the main building. We giggled about the teachers and lessons we'd all had in these corridors, were amazed to see a lift installed in what was Mr Newton's classroom and found our old form rooms. The wooden desks, the staffroom and the first-floor library – where a student once fell from a window, have all disappeared, but the general atmosphere is still the same. Downstairs, we realised the sickroom where girls used to hide during games lessons had disappeared too. And there was tangible shock to discover that the prefect's room was gone and the canteen had doubled in size! It was interesting how we were quite appalled by some of the changes, for no reason other than it skewed our own recollections!

Luckily, the hall, stage and gym are still the same as ever. The dreaded walk-through showers, however, have now been replaced by much more civilised private cubicles, so girls clearly don't have to go through the humiliation of walking naked through a stream of water overseen by PE teachers! Some changes are clearly for the best!

Our final stop was Rotherfield, which is still the sixth-form centre. Here we explored the rambling rooms which were home to our transformation into young adults. I remember watching Margaret Thatcher leave Downing Street for the final time on a television in our messy common room. Today, this room is an archive of Old Latin memorabilia. Jo and her team had thoughtfully laid out press cuttings and sports photos from our era, and we poured our way through them with laughter. There were stories about locking maths teachers in cupboards, hovering around the caged T-Hut boilers for warmth, reducing German teachers to tears, and of how we used to deface our hymn books (do pupils still have these?). Our days at The Latin were fun, full of drama and certainly shaped our futures.

There was merriment as we left, down 'Dark Alley' onto Chandos Road. We walked through Chandos Park, where many had bunked off for a crafty cigarette, and into town where the annual fair was in full swing. We had all really enjoyed our afternoon and were keen to spend the evening reminiscing some more. Where did we do that? At Villiers of course, where many of us enjoyed a legal drink at the bar for the first time!
