Welcome to the 18th edition of Latin Life

The news of the Queen's passing earlier this year gave us all pause for prolonged thought. Our link to the monarchy is a special one. The 'Royal' element of our school name dates back to 1597 when the Latin School in Buckingham was merged with the Thornton School, with the latter bequeathing its Royal Warrant to establish the newly combined Royal Latin School. Its Headmaster was James Smith and the Royal Charter and annual income of £10-8s-0½d was bestowed by Elizabeth I (and continued to be paid until the start of the 20th century).

What strikes me most about Queen Elizabeth II are the qualities she showed as a public servant, not least her sense of duty and commitment to her role. She stands as an exemplary role model for our students and all of us in public service. I found her funeral to be very moving, a feeling deepened when I realised that Oliver Davis (Class of 2016) had a prominent role (see above) in proceedings.

The Queen was also a great symbol of continuity, something which I hope you continue to see in our school. I have been delighted to read John Hounslow's (Class of 1970) new history of the school. Latin Lives: 600 Years of The Royal Latin School, which is featured on page 12 of this edition. John brings out the qualities of leadership, resilience, creativity and innovation which run across the decades and even centuries. As we approach 2023 I very much look forward to celebrating with you, particularly at reunions and the events scheduled throughout the year. I also, though, hope you enjoy seeing how the school has changed – the Latin has never rested on its past glories and 2023 gives us an opportunity to look to the future with optimism, even in the current gloomy times. As the Queen herself said, 'When life seems hard, the courageous do not lie down and accept defeat; instead, they are all the more determined to struggle for a better future.'



Introducing RLS Connect: a brand new resource for Old Latins

In January, all Old Latins will be able to join RLS Connect: a website which brings together all of the resources, events and information for Old Latins into one place - a 'one-stop shop' for alumni.

It will make it easier for you to find all of the information you need, from how to book tickets for forthcoming events and reunions, latest news about the school and about Old Latins, opportunities to mentor current sixthformers, careers opportunities being offered by Old Latins and eventually, access to a fully digitised archive, with all of our photographs and important documents safely stored online. RLS Connect will also allow you to search for classmates you may have lost contact with.

"On my first day in the job I remember sitting at an empty desk in Brookfield and asking where the alumni database was" remembers Jo Ballantine, Director of Development. "It quickly transpired that there wasn't one! Gradually Old Latins got in touch and twelve years later, we regularly communicate with almost four thousand Old Latins. I'm absolutely thrilled that the Governors have agreed

that we can launch RLS Connect and really transform the way Old Latins can interact with the school."

Setting yourself up on RLS Connect

Everyone we already communicate with should have a profile ready to be set up on RLS Connect, ready for you to populate with your own information. Don't worry - none of your profile will be visible to other website visitors, until and unless you want it to be! The website is secure and you have total control over whether your name even appears to others. Joining and entering your information is optional, but when you do - you can search for other Old Latins, and view lots of our news stories, photos and archive materials.

Louise Amodio and Lucy Beckett explain:

"We'd love you to visit the site and sign up, just by giving a few basic details - name, email/phone number, year of leaving etc. Then you will be able to explore the site and get to know how it works. We're adding more content all the time, so please do visit the website regularly. And do get in touch if you have any questions or suggestions for improvements - we have piloted the site with a group of Old Latins but we're very happy to incorporate new ideas!"

"I'm so delighted to be able to bring you RLS Connect at long last" says David Hudson. "I'm really looking forward to us being able to share more archive materials and school news more efficiently with Old Latins, and for us to be able to share opportunities for Old Latins to engage with school life today. RLS Connect will do what it promises - connect us all together much more deeply, and offer Old Latins a chance to interact with each other, and with us, , in a way which I hope brings lots of enjoyment and a shared sense of the special Royal Latin community of which we are all a part."

EVENTS

All of our events, reunions and celebrations will be featured on RLS Connect, so it will be your one stop shop for finding out what's coming up, and easily booking your tickets or reserving your place in the case of free events. We'll also bring you reports of events as they take place, with photo galleries of those who attended so you can share in the fun even if you weren't able to attend!

EXPERTISE

You can use RLS Connect to share expertise and experience with the school community, whether through writing a news article for us, offering to give a talk at school or at an event. Eventually we'll also have a discussion forum on the site so that you can consult the RLS Connect hive mind for help to answer a question, solve a problem, or create a discussion.

CAREERS

RLS Connect will enable Old Latins to connect to each other professionally. You can set up or join a group for your profession, advertise on our jobs board, and ask others for professional advice or recommendation, as well as getting involved in offering work experience placements or in our Aspirations Evening careers event at school.

HERITAGE

We're working with a specialist heritage company to professionally scan and upload as much of our archive material as possible to this section of RLS Connect. You'll be able to search the archive by name, and find photos, documents, school magazines, press cuttings and more.

MEMORIES

Sharing memories is one of the best things about being part of the Old Latins community. One memory triggers another and helps to piece together the way things were. On RLS Connect you can join a group for your year group and your decade, as well as groups for Art, Sport, Drama, Science, Boarders, D of E, anything you like really, and start sharing memories.

MENTORING

We'll be developing a mentoring section, so that you can use RLS Connect to volunteer to become a mentor (mostly virtually) to a current sixth-form student, to provide them with invaluable advice and guidance on making university and careers choices, goal setting, CV writing, interview techniques, confidence building etc.

FRIENDSHIP

Reconnecting old classmates with each other is one of the greatest privileges the Development Office has in its work to build our global network of Old Latins. Think of RLS Connect as the first place you can go to try to track down and get in touch with old friends - and those you may have lost touch with but often thought of over the years. You can search RLS Connect for the name of anyone you want to find, and then get in touch with them. If you agree to appear in search results, your classmates can message you too on RLS Connect, so make sure you check your inbox regularly to see who's been in touch!

600th Anniversary

Our big year is almost here!

Preparations continue for the 600th Anniversary of the Royal Latin School in 2023, and we're delighted to be able to bring you the calendar of special events for the year (see next page). The events have been devised in conjunction with the school's management team, students and the 2023 Committee of former parents, staff and Old Latins. Everyone has worked really hard to try to make sure that there is something for everyone! With the exception of the Gold Gala Ball and the Family Garden Party, all of the events are free to attend.

The 600th Anniversary will be launched in the Chantry Chapel – the first home of the school in Buckingham – on 18th January, with opportunities for the local community to pop in during the day to learn about the history of the school from school and National Trust staff and volunteers. Special anniversary events will then take place each month throughout the year and we'll send you full details of each event and how to reserve your places in January, as well as details of all of the other initiatives we'll be delivering next year, so that you can join in with the anniversary celebrations wherever you are in the world:



Royal Latin book hits the shelves!

With great excitement, we are thrilled to share that the new book about the school has been published, and is now available to buy. Latin Lives: 600 Years of The Royal Latin School has been a four year long labour of love (mostly!) for Old Latin John Hounslow (Class of 1970), who agreed to take on the challenge of producing a book as part of the 2023 commemorations.



Latin Lives tells the remarkable story of a school which has evolved throughout six centuries of triumphs and challenges, and gives a fascinating insight into leadership and the changing educational landscape in Buckingham. The book also includes a wonderful collection of memories and anecdotes from former teachers and students of the school that bring the spirit and friendships of the Royal Latin to life, and gives the reader a real sense of our historic school community and the ways in which it continues to innovate, thrive and inspire to this day. The book is dedicated to the memory of Robert Munday (Class of 1970), one of John's former classmates and a dear friend of the school.

David Hudson said: "We are so grateful to John for all of the time and energy he's invested in the writing of the book. The result is something that he should feel very proud of. It's exactly the publication we wanted to create - managing to succinctly set out the fascinating origins and evolution of the school, whilst also recounting anecdotes from Old Latins from every living generation. I'd like to extend my thanks to all of the Old Latins who so willingly shared their memories with John, and last but by no means least, to historian Dan Jones (Class of 1996) for writing the fabulous and moving Foreword. I really hope everyone enjoys reading it as much as I have!"

In conversation with Old Latins: How does it feel to come back to school?

Lots of people aren't sure what to expect when they step back through the school gates. So, we thought we'd chat to a few Old Latins about what it actually feels like to pay their old school a visit, to demystify the whole experience!



"Class reunions usually make me shudder and shiver, but this changed when I attended my Year Group reunion as we hit the 30 year mark. The School provided a superb programme where the archives were opened and arranged to remind us of our school days, and trigger those great memories. More importantly it gave us all a reason to reconnect and build our old school relationships as well as interweave these into existing friendship and business networks. There is serious value in coming back to the school and reconnecting, as everyone attending has great tales and stories on their journeys after leaving the Royal Latin School!"

"There is something deeply reassuring about one's old school constantly evolving. The Latin is flourishing, no doubt, but ultimately such change is heartening because it signals survival. The most precious aspect of my relationship with the Latin now is simply that it is still there; I can reminisce about the friendships and remember the good and the slightly-less-good times. Returning to the Latin encourages a natural reflection on my own life since school, too. It's an invitation to take stock. Above all, though, locating myself in the 600-year-old jigsaw of the Latin's history is a truly humbling experience. I always leave with a renewed sense of gratitude and an increasingly cemented feeling that I still, somehow, belong there."





"Whether your memories of the school were good or bad, it is always very nostalgic and sometimes quite therapeutic going back. It reminds you of the boy or girl you once were, the man or woman you have become and the part the school will inevitably have played in shaping you... most of all, going back enabled me to replay the many sounds I remembered hearing and they replayed in such a familiar way in my head... that's what happens when you go back and visit the school. I recommend you give it a try... just don't leave it too long... it's changing fast,.. but right now, there is still a lot of what you'll remember and it's worth going back to refresh some of those memories."

"We enjoy coming back to meet up with old school friends and to discuss the happy and not so happy times we spent here, and we are confident that some former pupils who have never re-visited the school would get the same reward if they gave it a try. At the same time we remind each other of the teachers whose subjects we enjoyed and those we found less interesting. We also like to catch up with former classmates and to discuss how well they did at University and what career they eventually chose to follow. We also like to understand what changes they'd make to this process if they had their time over again. At each visit we are always made to feel very welcome and our views and ideas are welcomed and taken seriously."





"There's a sense of wonder as you walk through the doors to the school you attended so many years ago. The same but different. The classrooms always seem smaller than you remember, but take a moment to sit where the desk you favoured was and the life and laughter in the room starts coming back to you... especially if you're visiting with some of those old school friends! You can bet that they remember some misdemeanours and memories that you had forgotten about and you'll be laughing in no time. Come back to the familiar corridors and you'll feel good about your school days. A visit will leave you feeling really happy and you'll be impressed with the mix of familiar sights and new."

Old Latins honoured by Her late Majesty the Queen


We would like to congratulate the two Old Latins who received honours from Her late Majesty the Queen in her last Birthday Honours: Virginia Sentance MBE (Class of 2009) and Sam Tatlow MBE (Class of 2005).





Virginia Sentance was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) for services relating to the delivery of COP26. She is currently Deputy Director, Sectoral Transitions, COP26 Presidency at the Cabinet Office.

Sam Tatlow is Creative Diversity Partner at ITV, and was also honoured with an MBE as part of Her late Majesty The Queen's Birthday Honours list, receiving the honour for her services to people with disabilities.




Tanya Rosie (Class of 2008)


Thank you to Tanya Rosie for getting in touch to let us know she recently had her first children's book published.
