Historic Chantry Chapel Hosts the 600th Anniversary Launch

On the 18th January 2023, the launch of our special anniversary year was marked with a day of celebration in the 12thcentury Chantry Chapel on Market Hill – the oldest building in Buckingham and the first home of the school in the town. The chapel is now managed by the National Trust, who very kindly gave us access to the building free of charge.

We were keen to share the occasion with the local community, and decided to begin the day by inviting members of the public to pop into the chapel for a coffee morning run by the students during the morning. It was wonderful to welcome people into the chapel on a bitingly cold January morning, and to see them enjoying learning about the early foundation of the school from the students and National Trust volunteers. Six young students played the role of a student from each of the six centuries, and six of our Year 12 students played the roles of each of our six founders (after whom our Houses are still named): Matthew de Stratton, John Ruding, John Barton, Sir Alexander Denton, Alderman Newton and Lady Verney. At lunch time, the school's newly-created Chamber Choir gave a special performance to the public, which was greatly enjoyed by all.

Class Visits

Throughout the afternoon, Mr Hudson welcomed Year 7 (1st year) students into the chapel in their forms to hear about the history of the school. Royal Latin teachers Mr and Mrs Snell provided wonderful musical accompaniment and regaled the students with a brief lesson on music from the 15th to the 17th centuries. Every student was presented with their special 2023 pin badge before leaving the chapel and returning to school, pausing at the gates of the George Grenville Academy site on Chandos Road, where the school was located for the first half of the 20th century.

We were thrilled that BBC South Today agreed to spend much of the day with us at the Chantry Chapel, to film for a piece to appear on the regional news bulletin the following day. After the fun and festivities of the daytime celebrations, the chapel took on a more reverent atmosphere, as the team prepared the historic building for the grand finale to the launch day: a private reception for sixty guests, students and staff, to formally commemorate the start of 2023.

Guests were welcomed by the stunning voices of Ella and Anna, from London-based Coro Spezzato, and enjoyed drinks and canapés kindly gifted by Impact Food Group. David Hudson, host for the evening, addressed guests and introduced a number of special guests, including the costumed students who had been performing as the six students and founders throughout the day.

Former Deputy Headteacher Andy Cooper stepped forward to describe 15th-century school life in the Chantry Chapel, before reciting the Pater Noster in Latin, and testing young students on their grasp of Latin. Royal Latin Governor the Reverend Peter Williams then spoke to guests about the role of religion in the school's survival over the centuries, before reciting a blessing in Latin. David Hudson spoke movingly about the changes the school had undergone across six centuries, and about his pride at leading the school into such a historic milestone anniversary. Guests remained in the chapel to toast the anniversary and to sign the official 2023 Visitors Book, which visitors to the school will be invited to add their signatures to throughout the year.

600 Years of Education: Reflections from our Headteacher, David Hudson

This year marks a very special moment, not only for the Royal Latin, but also for Buckingham and Buckinghamshire. Not many state schools are able to celebrate their 600th anniversaries (we think we are the 100th oldest school in the world!) and we are marking a truly significant moment in history. We recently launched this year of celebration in the Chantry Chapel which has stood in the heart of Buckingham for over 800 years – first as a hospital, then Chantry Chapel and school. Now owned by the National Trust this wonderful building stands as living testimony to a Latin education which has stood the test of time.

It is a privilege for me to be our Headteacher at such an auspicious moment. As I look back over our 600 years there have, of course, been significant changes. At the same time, however, there are also core values of the education we have provided over such a long period, which have continued to form a fundamental part of our school over these six centuries. So, what have we learned as we look back at 600 years of education?

At the heart of our education lie key values and virtues which can be traced back to our very origins. In this piece, I would like to highlight four particular values and virtues that have run through our history.


The first is resilience. Edmund Burke has described the key to institutional growth as a 'disposition to preserve and an ability to improve' and there is no doubt that the Latin School has always been a school with an instinct not only to survive but also to build on its foundations.

There have been moments in our long history when others could have closed us down or indeed we could have lost the will to continue. Henry VIII in the 16th century was no great supporter of Chantry Chapels but seemed to overlook Buckingham; the great fire in Buckingham in the 18th century (1725) was a direct threat to the fabric of the school; and two world wars were not enough to close the school, even temporarily.

More recently, of course, political change in the 20th century closed many grammar schools across the country as so many of them were converted to comprehensive status. Still the Royal Latin survived. Under my own tenure it caused me some sadness to be forced to close the school in March 2020 as the first lockdown was announced. But we have bounced back – staff and students have shown great strength to restore normal routine and show, as we always have, that we are able to weather the storm.

From time to time the survival of our school has even depended on the depth of the headmaster's own pocket, though I'm pleased to say this has been less the case in recent years! What is certain is that on many occasions we have come through difficult times only with the financial support and the kindness of key members of the school, town and county communities.

Reflections from our Headteacher continued

So survival yes. But the school has not only survived but flourished. What has marked the Latin through the centuries is a second value – a willingness to innovate, to regenerate, renew and respond to change. Those six boys of 1423 increased to 100 boys and girls when we moved to Chandos Road in 1907, 350 pupils moved to our current site in 1963, and we now stand as a school of over 1,300 students. The school facilities and opportunities these students enjoy are a world away from those of their predecessors. Again this has happened only with the philanthropic instincts and active support of key friends of the school.

Our founders spring to mind and have been key influences in this process – John Ruding restored the Chantry Chapel in the 15th century; Sir Alexander Denton provided financial support in the 17th century; Sir Harry Verney and Lady Verney had the foresight and vision to realise that if it wanted to improve then the school needed to move site. This new lease of life was further built upon, quite literally, by the move to our current site, something which would not have happened without the drive and commitment of that great predecessor of mine, George Embleton. And finally, this tradition has been preserved by Old Latins (such as Julian Thomas and Bernard Garbe) and parents and local supporters (such as Chris Price at ek robotics) who have literally invested in our future.

Whilst the look of the school may have changed, the third virtue of integrity remains a constant. High educational and personal standards have been increasingly expected from headteachers, governors, teachers and parents, and we have seen our students respond accordingly. The new motto which the school adopted in the 1990s encourages 'high expectations for all'. Everyone associated with the school appreciates the opportunities available to them, and rightly has a pride in being part of what one student recently described to me as 'the Latin Family'. As a result of the foundation of the education they receive, Royal Latin students go on to make a significant impact on Britain and the world – historians, scientists, architects, sportsmen and women, artists, musicians, engineers, teachers, doctors and many more professions benefit from our outstanding role models with so many of our alumni giving back so much to society. I am sure all of you reading this article will think of individuals who personify exactly the virtue to which I refer.

We are rightly, I believe, proud of the high quality academic education we have provided over many years. But equally important is the final value of nurturing linked as it is to that ancient virtue of compassion. The Latin has always stood as a major feature of life in the community of Buckingham. Having talked to lots of Old Latins over the last 13 years, the idea of giving back to the community of Buckingham and beyond would seem to be something which our school has cherished and developed. Recent years in particular have seen us open our doors to an increasingly wide range of diverse groups, sharing our facilities

with the young from primary schools right the way through to adults and the older generation. As I walk through our site on a typical evening in 2023, I can move from a Lillingstone Trust community lecture in the Discovery Centre, to watching hundreds of youngsters from local football clubs playing on our 3G football pitch and then dropping in to see drama and music students performing in the school hall. What a wonderful thing it is to see our school sitting proudly as a central part of community life.

I feel very honoured to serve as the 44th headteacher of our school nearly 500 years since Thomas Hawkins, our first recorded headmaster, trod the flagstones of the Chantry Chapel in 1524. I love our school, and feel privileged to be headteacher at such an important milestone in our history. I am very lucky to be able to take a lead in preserving what is, I believe, a unique heritage, to focus on the importance of stewardship, of handing on a legacy of which future generations can be proud, making our own small contribution to this ever-developing Latin tapestry. Dan Jones, Old Latin and best selling historian, has put it much better than I ever could. He contributed these wonderful words to our new history of the school, "When we acknowledge that we are part of something far greater than ourselves... we have a chance to reflect on what it is we stand for, what traditions we feel ourselves bound to uphold, and what we want to change to ensure that our school is fit to survive another generation. Another century. Another era."

And so it is. 600 years matter and we should never forget our history. Our predecessors matter and we should respect the role they played in forming what our school is today. Our community matters and we should continue to look to the future to see how we can play an active part in continuing to embrace change - how we respond, adapt and thrive.

This remarkable year, this momentous 600th anniversary, allows us on the one hand to look back, to respect and celebrate our very special history. But on the other hand, and at the same time, we will do what this Latin School has always done – both look forward to, and plan for, a vibrant future in 2024 and beyond.

Preserving our heritage and the Royal Latin archive

Our 600th Anniversary brings renewed importance to all of the work we have been doing over the last decade to preserve photographs, documents, publications and physical items in our Archive Room in Rotherfield House. Documenting the anniversary itself is also important - we imagine our successors looking back at 2023 in another century's time and perusing all of the photographs and event programmes for inspiration!

2023 Archive & Heritage Day

As one of our favourite annual alumni events, we were keen to ensure that the 2023 Archive Day would be an extra special celebration of our heritage, and bigger and better than ever before. This year's event (see opposite page for details) will include new opportunities to peruse our archive collection – including the entire digital archive – as well as to visit one of the finest heritage assets on the school site: the William de Morgan tiled fireplace in Brookfield House. Digital Archive on RLS Connect
