RLS Accelerates Plans for New Discovery Centre

Our 600 Campaign has gone from strength to strength since the last edition of Latin Life. We are delighted that in the first year of fundraising, we have generated £3.5 million towards the new building to replace the existing science laboratories.

The Discovery Centre plans have been attracting support from far and wide, including a recent gift of £100,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation – one of the biggest charitable foundations in the UK. A multi-million pound contribution has also been made by the Department for Education,

in recognition of the innovative approach being taken by the school as well as the need to replace the existing fifty year old facilities.


Planning permission has been granted, and construction will commence in January 2014, with the new building reaching completion in late spring 2015 – subject to two very important factors: the weather, and our continued fundraising efforts! We have sufficient funding to begin the building works, but still need a further £1.5 million in order to deliver the first class, state-of-the-art building that our students deserve.

The pressure is really on now' said Jo Ballantine, RLS Director of Development. 'We have a matter of months to identify where our shortfall is going to come from, in order to ensure that the building can be completed. We have been busy approaching companies, charitable foundations and individuals for sponsorship and donations, and are utterly determined to reach the £5 million target.'

Continued from front page... 'The next few months will be the toughest of the campaign so far' agreed David Hudson. 'We've successfully attracted external investment in the project, and are now going to have to rely on the school community to combine forces and dig deep to enable us to reach our goal.'

'We really want to involve Old Latins in this exciting phase. If you've ever thought about 'giving something back' to your old school – then now would be a great time to do it! Daily Mail Vase

Royal Latin won their first U15 Vase trophy after a frenetic opening match of the Daily Mail Schools Rugby finals at Twickenham on 23rd March.



Despite freezing conditions there was a blistering opening encounter. Felsted dominated the early stages and took a well-deserved lead but Latin responded quickly with a high quality try from Sam Burgin. Will Hughes matched this with an equally impressive conversion, nailing the kick from the touchline.

Back came Felsted. Before the whistle blew, two trys were scored, taking the half time score to 13—7. Felsted were ahead. After a motivational "chat" from their coaches, Latin responded with sustained pressure. Elliot Pittwood crashed over in the corner to reduce the deficit to 13-12

As the game entered a tense final period, Latin again found themselves in good



territory in front of goal. The pack rumbled on and, ball in hand, Joe Robey surged for the line. After a nail biting delay and consultation between the officials the try was finally awarded—fly half Will Hughes successfully converting again.

In spite of Felsted pouring forward in search of an equaliser, Latin remained resolute in defence to seal their first ever finals win and ignite scenes of mass celebration.

Archive Open Day 1st May 2013

Wednesday May 1st was sunny, clear and warm and over 100 Old Latins enjoyed the second of our annual Archive Open Days. The Rotherfield Archive room and the Lecture Theatre were crammed with Old Latins examining documents, letters, photos and memorabilia.

In the Lecture Theatre during the afternoon three Old Latins gave short talks about their days at RLS but only after Ollie Toon, the Under 15 Rugby Captain of the victorious RLS team at Twickenham, had introduced proceedings with an account of the match day. Great applause from Old Latins echoed by many Old Latins abroad who have emailed their congratulations.

Dan Jones, as student from the '90s and now author of "The Plantagenets" and more recently "The Warrior Kings and Queens of England", explained how his love of history, shaped by his tutor Starkey at Cambridge, had first begun at RLS when Robin Green was Head of Department. Dan is now a media commentator on history as well as an author. Teachers do make a difference!

Tony Barr is also an historian - of the RLS in the '30s and '40s. An Old Boy of the school, he has a prodigious knowledge of the Grenville years of RLS and his detailed, informed account of his time at school, of his fellow pupils, of the staff and of the buildings was exceptional, even down to detailing on maps the separate Air Raid shelters for boys and girls. A captivating address.

We began our talks with a Rugby captain and ended with a Rugby coach and ex PE teacher- Clive Martin. Clive travelled up from his new home in Brighton to give a splendid account of sports at RLS, illustrated with a wide range of photos covering Ennerdale, Water Sports holidays in France, winter sports for girls and boys, athletics—and some great photos of the swimming galas in the old open air pool. Tricia Morgan who had returned to school for the Archive Day especially remembered the Orienteering competitions, some at night, held at the Morgan farm at Shalstone.



The Buckingham Partnership SCITT


As the autumn term started, not only did we welcome new teaching staff, and our new year 7 and 12 pupils, but also 42 trainee teachers including 4 'Old Latins'.

The trainee teachers are following a PGCE (post graduate certificate in education) course leading to QTS (qualified teacher status) in a range of subjects including Maths, Science, MFL, Drama, History, Geography and English as well as Primary Teaching.

The Buckingham Partnership SCITT is a registered Higher Education Institution and accredits its own courses; The Royal Latin functions as the Lead School within the partnership of 22 schools throughout Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire. Trainees are based in one of our partner schools, but attend weekly centralised training at RLS. Many of our teaching staff are involved in the SCITT, and are sharing their expertise with newcomers to the profession.
