VE-Day 80: memories of 8th May 1945

Thank you to Anthony Barr for writing to us in May with his his recollections of VE -Day, below. It is always fascinating to hear about school life decades ago, particularly during the war years.

The celebration of VE-Day in May has brought back memories of the old school at this time, some eighty years ago. I wrote a brief note about D-Day some years ago and I realised how unperturbed the school was by wartime events, and it is true again at the end of the European war in 1945.

My father was still in the RAF so we were a truncated family and gradually the news had come how the Nazi power in Europe was coming to an end. Churchill's decision to establish a VE-Day was a slight anti-climax to the events in Germany, despite the fact that the final official surrender of the enemy was planned for VE-Day too. The reason I use the word 'anti-climax' is simply that some things had changed in our lives that already signaled the beginning of peace. I suppose the most significant of these was the ending of the blackout. Since 1939 we had restrictions on 'showing a light' from our homes and even our bicycle lamps had been shaded to prevent enemy aircraft movement. By 8th May we were free from this wretched restriction. (Parts of the school had blackout curtains, but the use of the buildings for evening events was quite limited. In midwinter it was particularly difficult when the lighting was required in the late afternoons for the normal timetable. Our food rationing, however, continued for years after VE-Day.

We had the day off from school for 8th May 1945 without a major celebration, but I believe that in these few days of early May the school arranged a party, based on the Christmas events that we regularly held for senior students. The girls danced in the Assembly Hall, I recall, and the music came from the loudspeakers suspended in the middle of the room. I was in Form 3 at this point in my school life and we felt slightly side-lined by the events on the dance-floor. The staff seem, in my recall, to have mysteriously

disappeared from view, which was an unusual event.

At home on 8th May we depended on local arrangements for a Village Hall tea party and as the evening rolled on we had a huge bonfire in Gawcott Chapel Close and I believe that Edwin Jeffs, whose obituary you recently published, exploded an army firework, a Thunder Flash, which was the only means of having a fireworks display.

I remember so well at the end of VE-Day seeing the setting of the sun and wondering what would be occurring in the near future and what freedom from warfare would reveal. The Asian war had to be concluded, although the defeat of Germany had been our greatest concern, but no one knew of the atomic bomb and its world-changing effect. Our first real contact with the end of hostilities was the return of the British prisoners of war. This happened quite rapidly and in the village we saw old faces return. We went back to the old school at RLS in Chandos Road and the routine was unchanged.

They were funny old days at our school of about 180 scholars and quite unrecognisable to the present day students at RLS.



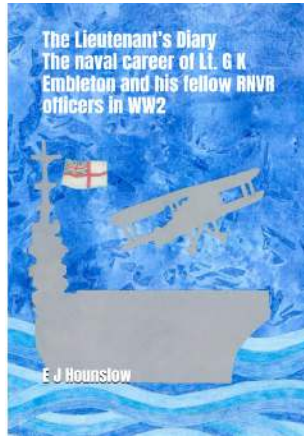

Old Latins in print

John Hounslow (Class of 1970)



John Hounslow is the author of *Latin Lives: 600 Years of the Royal Latin School*, and has now published this new book, also linked to the Royal Latin, as he explains below.

Those students and staff who were at the Royal Latin School between 1948 and 1979 will know George Embleton, the headteacher who completed an amazing 31 years in post. They will also probably be familiar with the fact that he was in the Royal Navy during WWII.

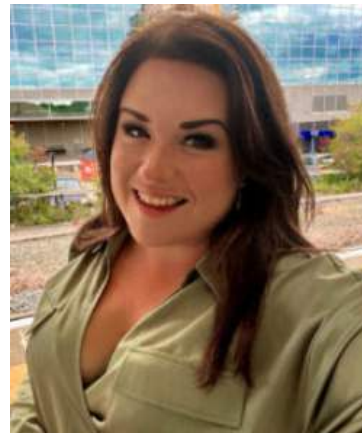
Thanks to the kindness of his two daughters, Rosemary and Jane, I have had access to a diary he kept during his war service as well as his personnel record obtained from the Royal Naval Archives. This enabled me to write *The Lieutenant's Diary* which tells the amazing story of his career in the Navy, firstly in the aircraft carrier HMS *Victorious*, where he served on the infamous arctic convoys to Operations Pedestal and Torch in the Mediterranean. Later, whilst serving in the battleship HMS *King George V*, he had the honour of bringing Winston Churchill back to the UK from Gibraltar.

He subsequently served in the Admiral's flagship, HMS *Scylla*, during the D-Day landings and when the ship limped back to Chatham after striking a mine he was transferred to HMS *Indefatigable* for the attacks on the Tirpitz before sailing out to join the US Fleet in the Pacific. There he was involved in fighting against Kamikaze attacks during the landings on Iwo Jima.

Embleton's war ended with the British ship anchored in Tokyo Bay as the Imperial Japanese Forces came onboard the USS *Missouri* to sign the surrender document which brought the war to a close.

Emma Graham (née Tallon, Class of 2005)

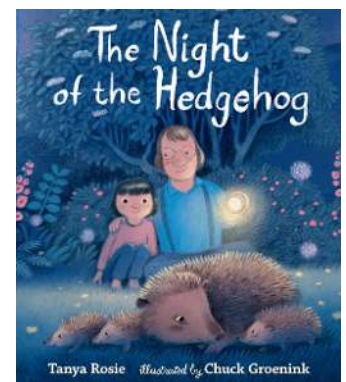

We were delighted to welcome Sam Tatlow, from the Class of 2005, to be our guest of honour at the annual Prize-giving evening this year, on 27th June.

Sam is Head of Diversity Equity and Inclusion at ITV and is part of the team delivering their Diversity Acceleration Plan. She is involved in delivering ITV's Disability agenda and also works closely with producers and the commissioning teams to ensure a diverse and inclusive team are involved for ITV commissions working particularly closely with the teams in factual entertainment, sport, daytime and the soaps.

Prior to joining ITV, Sam worked for training and consultancy company thinkBIGGER! where she worked on projects such as the Channel 4 Production Training Scheme and on the training programme for the disabled presenters and reporters for the coverage of the London 2012 Paralympic Games.

Sam Chairs BAFTA's Disability Advisory Group, is a member of their Learning, Inclusion and Talent Committee and is part of BAFTA's Diversity Steering Group for the Awards. She is part of the British Film Institute's Disability Advisory Group, is Chair of the Board of Trustees for Graeae Theatre Company, the UK's leading disabled-led theatre company and in 2021 was listed in the Shaw Trust's Power 100, the list of the top 100 most influential Disabled people in the UK. She was awarded an MBE for her services to Disabled People in the Queen's Jubilee Birthday Honours list in June 2022.

At Prize-giving Sam delivered an inspiring speech about her life and career since leaving school, including the following extract:

'When thinking about this evening and what I wanted to say, I tried to imagine what you as the students would like to hear, and perhaps what I would have liked to hear about when I was sitting in your seats all those years ago.'

Thinking back over my career I'd love to be able to tell you that there was a master plan, that I had it all mapped out and that it went perfectly step by step. But that wouldn't be true. But what I can say is that there is a real power in saying YES. Taking opportunities, trying something new, something different or something you hadn't expected. Saying yes even when you're not quite sure whether you know if it's the right thing and giving it a go anyway. I think that's what has been the power behind getting to where I am now.'

I left the Royal Latin not really knowing what I wanted or what my life would look like. I knew I enjoyed drama and I was good at it. Back then our drama teacher Mr Boileau saw something in me and encouraged me throughout my time at the school so I knew drama was something I could do. So after A levels I headed to Bretton Hall, Leeds University to study Theatre and Performance. I knew I didn't want to be an actor so drama school wasn't for me, but this place, set in the middle of the Yorkshire Sculpture Park felt like home the moment I arrived for my audition. I said yes when they offered me a place; I said yes to the course, to living in the middle of a field, to leaving home and traveling up north and giving myself the opportunity to give it a go.'

Thank you, Sam, for continuing to support your old school, and our students, twenty years after leaving. We look forward to welcoming you back again in the not too distant future.

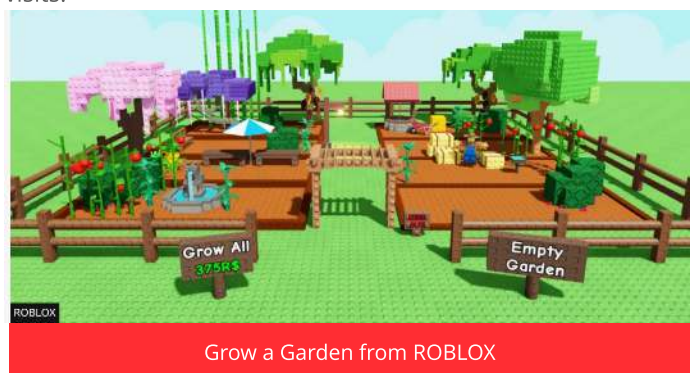
George Smith (Class of 2020)

He is currently Creative Director for Splitting Point Studios, developers of the Roblox sensation, *Grow a Garden*, a game which recently broke the record for the number of concurrent players – 21.3 million! This beat the previous record held by Epic Games' *Fortnite*.
